OUR THANKS FOR A GREAT ANNUAL CONFERENCE!!





The Association of State Floodplain Managers is an organization of professionals involved in floodplain management, flood hazard mitigation, National Flood Insurance Program, and flood preparedness, warning and recovery. Floodplain managers and other stakeholders can take an exam to be certified in floodplain management. The CFM® exam

It is recommended to consistently study for 3-6 months prior to taking the exam. The study guide details all the material that should be studied prior to taking the exam.



This certification program educates surveyors on the forms and processes associated with floodplain properties and the submittal of Elevation Certificates. To become CFS certified, licensed surveyors must successfully complete the three-day certification seminar and exam. PDH's are awarded for the seminar; however, no PDH credit is given for

the exam. The specific topics covered in the course are: National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP), FIRM Maps, NFIP Regulations and Elevation Certificates, Letters of Map Correction processing.

The class will be held in October 2-5, 2019 in Franklin, TN. The Tennessee Association of Professional Surveyors will send out registration information and collect the registration fee.

The NFIP is a federal program that is implemented on a local level. Localities have the authority and responsibility to manage development in the floodplain. Regulations adopted through a local floodplain management ordinance are administered and enforced by the community, not the State or FEMA. Requirements found in a local floodplain management ordinance will be based on flood zones mapped in that community.

If a local floodplain administrator has questions, he or she should call or email the State NFIP Coordinator. The local applicant should not be diverted to the State office for assistance as this weakens the local enforcement capabilities.



Waterways, Including Culverts and Bridges

Permits may be required from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) and your regional Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation (TDEC) office.

Projects that may require permits include:

Work proposed in a waterway, including tributaries, wetlands, small streams and lakes.

Actions that may require permits, include but are not limited to:

- Construction and demolition
- Dredging or filling any part of surface water
- Repairing or replacing a bridge, culvert or



Obtaining permits prior to construction is the responsibility of the project applicant



Floodplains and Wetlands

- Any modifications or construction in a floodplain or wetland must be reviewed by FEMA and may require a public notice
- Debris must not be stored in a floodplain or wetland, even temporarily
- Debris removal from a wetland must be coordinated with USACE, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS), and your regional TDEC office before any disturbance
- For information on floodplain permitting, contact your local National Flood Insurance Program Coordinator

Threatened and Endangered Species

The Applicant and FEMA may be required to complete consultation with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and your regional TDEC office for projects that affect:

- Critical habitat, which may be located in or near water, forested areas, fields, or along the road edge.
- Endangered or threatened species within a county (listed on USFWS and TDEC websites).





Historic and Archaeological Resources

FEMA may be required to complete consultation with the State Historic Preservation Office or tribes prior to any work beginning for projects including, but not limited to:

- Repair or demolition of structures or buildings built before 1961.
- Ground disturbing activities including projects in farmland, parking lots, or forested areas.
- Use of borrow pits

Work on historic bridges must be coordinated with the TN Department of Transportation

Federal Laws

- **Endangered Species Act**
- National Historic Preservation Act
- Clean Water Act
- Executive Order for Floodplains (11988)
- Executive Order for Wetlands (11990)

Project types that may require consultation

- Debris removal
- Ground disturbance, even within the right of way
- Any hazard mitigation
- Improved or alternate projects
- Changes in scope of work

Debris Disposal and Hazardous Materials

FEMA and TEMA must be informed of the final location of all debris.

Staging areas will require site approval from your regional TDEC office.

Demolition of structures, regardless of asbestos content, must be coordinated with your regional TDEC office.

Before burning, you must obtain certification from TDEC (year round) and a burn permit from the Division of Forestry (between Oct 15-May 15 only). Burn permits can be obtained by phone by calling your county office. - clearance
- collection
- staging

- removal
- disposal

Types of debris:

· trees and gravel

The applicant is responsible for coordinating with TDEC and for obtaining and complying with all required permits before burning,







